Seventeen-year-old Kaitlin Malone was born to hate the Crutchfields. The hatred her family has harbored for generations is the one thing she can count on - and the very thing she believes will sustain her now that her father has been imprisoned for murdering Robert Crutchfield. But then Kaitlin stumbles on a rare opportunity to walk in the enemy's shoes and what she discovers rocks the foundation of her entire world.

Scribbler of Dreams, published in the fall of 2002, is one of Pearson's earlier published books. Some of her most recent "hits" would be *The Fox Chronicles* consisting of three intense books, which are also a great read. *Scribbler of Dreams* is like a modern day *Romeo and Juliet*, two rival families with two love-struck teens stuck in the middle. This story will pull at the chords of your heart; the amount of teenage angst is enough to make anyone a little teary-eyed or even distressed. One of my favorite characters is Becky, Kaitlin's best friend. She helps Kaitlin throughout this chain of events and is constantly by her side, even after Kaitlin weaves her web of lies a bit too far. *Scribbler of Dreams* is a great book that'll keep you hooked and begging for more. Brownie in a Mug simplyrecipes.com

1/4 cup flour
1/4 cup sugar
2 Tbsp cocoa (natural, unsweetened)
Pinch of salt
Tiny pinch of cinnamon
1/4 cup water
2 Tbsp canola oil or vegetable oil (NOT extra virgin olive oil, it's too strongly flavored)
1 to 2 drops vanilla extract



1 small scoop of ice cream or 1 or 2 teaspoons heavy whipping cream to serve

Place flour, sugar, cocoa, salt, and cinnamon in a microwave safe ceramic mug. Stir with a fork or spoon to mix well and break up any clumps.

Add the oil, water, and vanilla to the cup and stir until the mixture is smooth and there are no lumps.

Place in microwave and heat on high until the mixture is cooked through, about a 1 minute and 40 seconds for a 1000 watt microwave. You may have to experiment and adjust the time for less or more powerful microwaves. If you don't know the power level on your microwave, start with 60 seconds and increase until the brownie is done. It should still be moist when cooked through, not dry.

Let cool for a minute and serve with a scoop of vanilla ice cream or a teaspoon or two of whipping cream poured over.
