Shanoah's Buddy Walk

Shanoah Mooney, daughter of Daniel and Joni Mooney, was born on February 22, 1998, with Down Syndrome, a genetic disorder caused by the presence of all or part of an alternative chromosome 21, which is one of the 23 pairs of chromosomes in humans. Down Syndrome is typically associated with physical growth delays, characteristic facial features, and mild to moderate intellectual disability.

In 2003, the Mooney family started *The Buddy Walk* event to raise awareness about Down Syndrome and other disabilities. Shanoah is a regular teenager who loves performing, basketball, bowling, playing on her sisters' iPad, and talking on the phone. Each October, people get together at Shanoah's Park in Greenbush. They walk, visit, and have a good time while raising funds. Fund raising forms are sent to individuals, businesses, and anyone willing to help prior to the event. People who donate \$20 also get a Buddy Walk t-shirt. The money



The Buddy Walk makes is donated. Last year, \$500 was given to Badger School's FCCLA group. This year they donated \$500 to Badger School's FIRST Robotics team. Joni Mooney has this to say, "Schools and people dedicated to the donations are and have been important in our lives; we have donated to the Greenbush, Middle River, and Badger School Special Ed Departments, to the Greenbush pool, and to families who are in need. We give back everything that everyone has so generously donated to other organizations."

Some of the money raised is also given to the Brady Scholarship in honor of Brady Hasson, a Greenbush graduate, who passed away in May 2012, and was very close to Joni Mooney. Shanoah Mooney is also a Greenbush student. The \$500 scholarship recipient is chosen each year by Brady's parents Dwight and Darcy Hasson and Joni Mooney.

This will educate and promote positive life skills and incorporate leadership characteristics. Badger Paraprofessionals Support Students, Staff, and Learning



In 1941, fifteen-year-old Lina is preparing for art school, first dates, and all that summer has to offer. But one night, the Soviet secret police barge violently into her home, deporting her along with her mother and younger brother. They are being sent to Siberia. Lina's father has been separated from the family and sentenced to death in a prison camp. All is lost.

Lina fights for her life, fearless, vowing that if she survives she will honor her family, and the thousands like hers, by documenting their experience in her art and writing. She risks everything to use her art as messages, hoping they will make their way to her father's prison camp to let him know they are still alive.

It is a long and harrowing journey, and it is only their incredible strength, love, and hope that pull Lina and her family through each day. But will love be enough to keep them alive?

Between Shades of Gray, published fall of 2011, is Ruta Sepety's first published novel. Between Shades of Gray is a heart wrenching story. A powerful piece from this story says, "Have you ever wondered what a human life is worth? That morning, my brother's was a watch." Can you even imagine living in a time where a life is meaningless, and a man could shoot another man down without flinching, where a life is worth a simple pocket watch? It was baffling what happened to Lina and her family. She lived through so much, but even as she watched those around her die, get sick, or betray her, she never gave up. Badger English teacher, Ms. Ylitalo also read this book and had this to say, "Between Shades of Gray is a great read for everyone because of the realistic setting during war time and the intriguing main character, Lina. This young girl's journey is both emotional and powerful, making this an awesome read for anyone. Beware though...you may shed a few tears. I know I did."

I recommend this book to anyone who wants a relatively easy read and an enlightened perspective of life. Between Shades of Gray is a very powerful book that will keep your attention from start to finish.

- Bring a large pot of lightly salted water to a boil. Add egg noodles and boil for 8 minutes, or until tender. Drain, and rinse under cool running water.
- In a large saucepan or Dutch oven, combine broth, salt, and poultry seasoning. Bring to a boil. Stir in celery and onion. Reduce heat, cover, and simmer 15 minutes.
- In a small bowl, mix cornstarch and water together until cornstarch is completely dissolved. Gradually add to soup, stirring constantly. Stir in noodles and chicken. Heat through.






No, because animal testing for medical research would just hurt the animal. If they are testing it for human use, we won't know what will happen if we take the medicine.







The headset mounts on your face and brings you into the game with a 3D experience. At prices around \$300, you get 1280×800 resolution, which leads to an effective of 640×800 per eye. The headset fills the wearer's entire field of view, blocking out the real world. Although it won't be available to the public until later this year, the Oculus is expected to be a big hit.

Samsung Galaxy Note: Like all Samsung Galaxy Note phones, it is a bigger-than-normal phone and expensive (around \$350). Some reviews say the Samsung Galaxy Note is more tablet than phone and others say it's a hybrid of the two gadgets. These phones aren't like other phones, they have a stylus and an added pen input so they work pretty well as a small tablet. This is a good phone if you're into the portability of a Smartphone and the capabilities of a tablet.

<u>PlayStation Vita</u>: The power of a gaming console in your hands! Released a couple years ago, the PS Vita is a handheld gaming device that includes two analog sticks, a 5-inch multi-touch capacitive touch screen, and Bluetooth, Wi-Fi, and optional 3G capabilities for around \$200-\$250. Although being criticized for its high prices, the PS Vita has received generally positive reviews. It is considered one of the "most powerful and physically capable hand-held gaming devices ever made so far."

Favorite grade you played basketball in: Junior year because I got solid minutes on JV and played my heart out even though I didn't get much chance to play varsity.


Favorite position(s) to play: Guard, because it is a position where you have to be quick.

1 cup all-purpose flour

1 teaspoon baking soda

1 teaspoon ground cinnamon

1/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg

2 cups chopped peeled or unpeeled cooking apples (2 medium

Stir in flour, baking soda, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, the nutmeg, and salt. Stir in apples. Spread batter in pan. Bake 25 to 25 minutes or until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Meanwhile, in 1-quart saucepan, heat sauce ingredients over medium heat, stirring frequently, until butter is melted and sauce is hot. Serve warm sauce over warm cake.
