Night of Broken Glass

On November 7, 1938, a 17-year-old German Jewish refugee killed the third secretary of the German embassy in Paris. His intentions were to avenge the deportation of his father to Poland and the ongoing trials against the Jewish people. He had meant to kill the German ambassador, but unfortunately the secretary was sent out and he was killed on false impression. The Nazis used this as an excuse to attack the Jews and their community. In two days, over 250 synagogues (Jewish house of worship) were burned and over 7,000 Jewish work places were trashed.

On November 9, 1938, German minister, Joseph Goebbels, delivered a passionate speech to the Nazi party in Munich. After the speech, Nazi officials ordered Nazi Storm Troopers to attack Jews and destroy their homes, businesses, and houses of worship. This lasted until the morning of November 10 and became known as *Kirstallnacht*, the *Night of Broken Glass*. Nazi's also fined the Jewish communities. They would fine them \$400,000,000 in American money. Jews were ordered to clean up and make repairs after the Nazi raid. They were denied the right to collect their insurance for the damages done to their buildings. Instead, the German state took payments insurers owed to the Jewish property holders. In the end, Jews were banned from all areas of public life in Germany.

The Night of Broken Glass took place on November 9 and 10. It was a violent attack by the German Nazi's on the Jews of Poland and Germany. They went out on rampages: killing, raping, and capturing many Jews. It's called *the Night of Broken Glass* because the Nazi soldiers targeted stores that were run or owned by Jews, breaking windows and burning down buildings. It was a violent and sudden attack that is believed to have started the Holocaust. The day after the first attack of *the Night of Broken Glass* 30,000 Jewish men were arrested for the "crime" of being Jewish. Surprisingly enough, it was the Germans who came up with the name as a mockery to what they had done. The tragedies Jewish families had to go through, not only that November, but throughout the entire Holocaust are unimaginable, and definitely unforgivable.

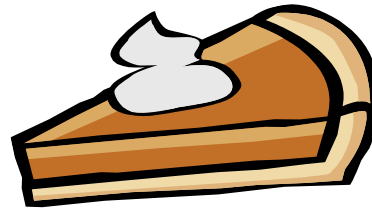


Thanksgiving Sweets

Mini Pumpkin Pies

- 2 prepared pie crusts
- 3 eggs, divided
- 1 (8 ounce) package cream cheese, softened
- ½ cup white sugar
- 1 cup canned pumpkin
- 1 tsp vanilla extract
- 1 tsp pumpkin pie spice



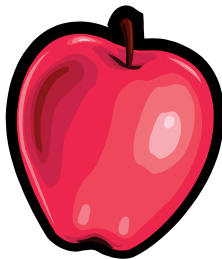
Preheat oven to 350 degrees F

Roll each pie crust out onto a floured surface to a rough rectangle about 11 inches square. Cut each pie crust into 12 3-inch rounds.

Fit the little pie crust circles into 24 mini pie dishes.

Separate one egg and place the egg white into a small bowl. Beat the egg white until slightly frothy and brush the edges of each mini pie crust with egg white. Place the remaining yolk into a bowl and beat with remaining 2 eggs. Mix the softened cream cheese, sugar, pumpkin, vanilla extract, and pumpkin pie spice into the eggs to make a smooth filling. Spoon about 2 tablespoons of the filling into each crust.

Bake the pies in the preheated oven until the crust edges are golden brown and the filling is set, about 15 minutes. Allow to cool before eating



Apple Pie Bites

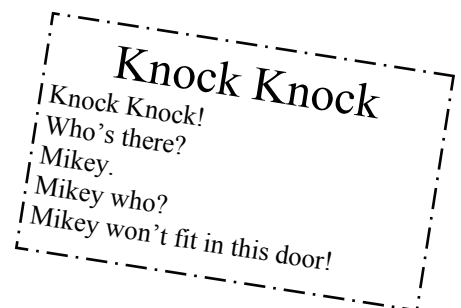
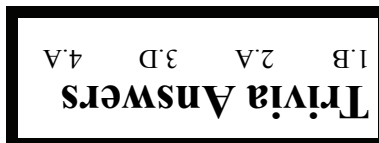
- 1 tube crescent rolls
- 1 apple (sliced thin)
- Cinnamon
- Brown Sugar
- 3-4 Tbsp melted butter

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Roll out the dough on a greased cookie sheet, brush with butter and sprinkle brown sugar and cinnamon in individual pieces of dough. Roll up thin apple slices in the dough forming a crescent, brush with melted butter and top with cinnamon. Repeat for others. Bake for 12-15 Minutes. Remove from oven, filling will be hot! You may also use peach or pear slices.

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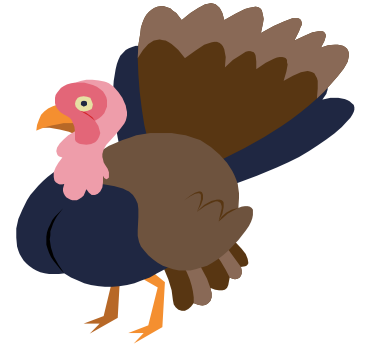

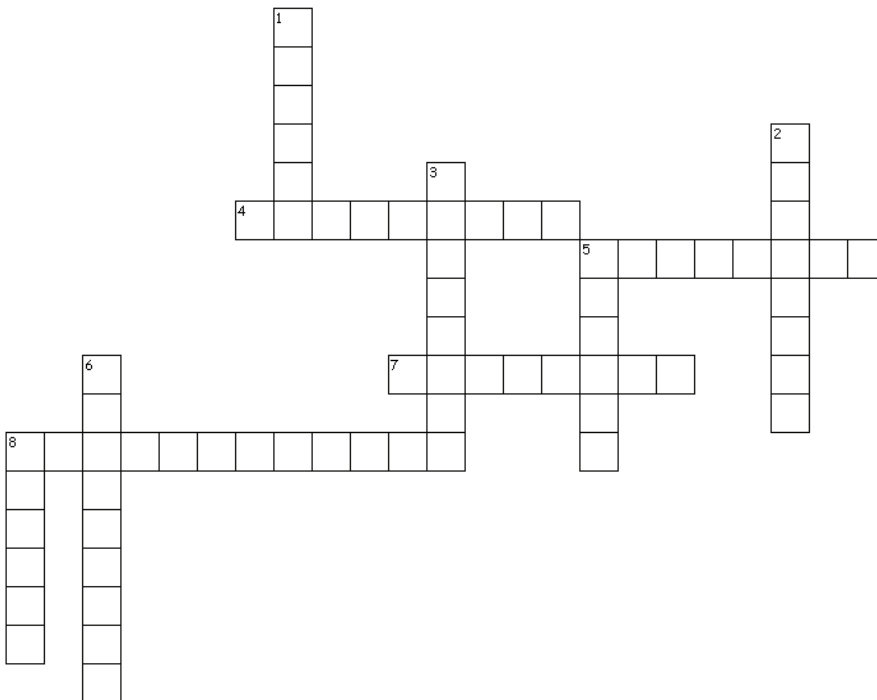
